## Key messages for parents about their role in their child’s career decision making

These four statements could accompany any communications about these videos, or if you are just starting to bring parents in on their child’s career learning journey:

- Many of us can feel out of our depth talking to our children about jobs and how to get started in a career. But, talking to your child really matters and can make a real difference to their future
- Think about what motivates your child, what they’re good at and the skills which employers will find valuable
- There are lots of careers out there that you may not know much about but you don’t need to
- It’s ok not to have all the answers, and to learn about new options with your child

Add these videos to the parents page of your school or college website with details about where to get further support. Good places to direct parents to are the National Careers Service or parent facing Talking Futures website.	Use these videos as part of an invite to an information event for parents. For example, you could link to them in texts or emails out to parents as a way of grabbing attention.	Use these videos as a powerful way to start an event. Follow the screening of the videos by asking parents to discuss how the films made them feel or what learning they took from them.

Sometimes staff without responsibility for the careers programme can feel out of loop themselves. Use these videos as part of CPD for other staff in the school or college.	Have these films playing on screens in school or college foyers, or during parents evenings.	Create a home learning activity around the videos. For example, students could play one or more of the videos to a parent and ask five follow-up questions to capture their parent reactions and experiences.
